This month Associate Minister, Andrew Haines, writes...

How many members of the Church of England does it take to change a light bulb? You don't know? Neither does anybody else, according to the official answer: "What? Change? The Church of England?" There is a widespread perception that nothing ever changes – not even the light bulbs.

I was checking out the lighting at All Saints' last Sunday (as well as listening to the sermon), and they are fairly easily accessible. Even so, I suspect it takes someone with no fear of heights to climb up and change them when necessary. In my last parish, the lights were mounted very high up and required a very long ladder and nerves of steel to reach them. These musings are by way of introduction to two themes that govern the life of our Church at the moment: change and teamwork.

The question of who will change the light-bulbs points to the wider fact that the life of the Church depends, for its well-being, on the efforts of a good many people, each bringing their own particular gifts and energies to bear for the well-being of the whole. Saint Paul likens the Church to the human body; it consists of many members, each having a different function. Our bodies are at their best when each organ and limb is working well and fulfilling its own function in harmony with every other part of the body. So, too, the Church depends on every member working well in harmony with each other, so that it can truly be effective in its ministry and mission. It can be very easy to lapse into thinking that everything can be done by a few people or, even worse, the Church can become a one-man band. Times such as now remind us that we all have our part to play, and we are indeed grateful for all those, especially our Churchwardens, who have taken on extra responsibilities and commitments as we look to the future.

That future might look very different. There are still discussions to be had, and decisions to be taken. But change is something that happens all the time, in all areas of life. In fact, it is a natural part of actually being alive. Sometimes it happens suddenly and dramatically. Sometimes it is almost imperceptible. For many, the Authorised Version of the Bible, and the Book of Common Prayer, are the gold-standard of Anglican liturgical expressions and practice, and both still have their place today. Many words and phrases from both have found their way into everyday usage, without us necessarily being aware of where they have come from. However, the passage of four hundred years since their publication has seen language change to such an extent that some of their words now have an entirely different, or opposite, meaning to that which was originally intended. Modern liturgies and Bible translations seek to reflect that change, so that worship and study are possible in language that is comprehensible to our own generation, as it was to the authors and translators of years past.

The language changes, and we as people change. But behind those changes is the unchanging truth of the love of God for each one of us, and His call to us

to find life fulfilment through the leadership and pattern of His Son, Jesus Christ. This gospel call needs to be heard afresh in every generation, in a manner that draws out our faith and worship. I pray especially that, as we work together as a body in harmony, that gospel message will be heard and embraced in these days in a way that enables it to be faithfully passed on to those yet to come.

Our New Bishop

On Saturday, 7 June The Right Reverend Sophie Jelley was Welcomed and Installed as the 10th Bishop of Coventry. The Cathedral was packed with some 800 people for the Service, who enjoyed tea and cake afterwards.



The Charterhouse, Coventry

(also known as St Anne's Priory)

One of the most interesting relics of medieval times which remain in this part of the Midlands is the once Carthusian monastery of St Anne, situated on the east bank of the River Sherbourne, opposite the London Road Cemetery and in an area once called Shortley, one of the lost villages of Warwickshire.

In 1382 King Richard II gave land and later laid the foundation stone for the

Priory, and remains of that building can still be found in the new building which is called Charterhouse. Following the dissolution of the monasteries by King Henry VIII, Charterhouse was privately owned up until 1940 when it was gifted to the people of Coventry. Fast forward through many uses until 2011 when it was acquired by The Charterhouse Coventry Preservation Trust (now Historic Coventry Trust), which raised the funding and led an extensive restoration of the site.



Today, the Trust has partnered with the National Trust to manage the property on its behalf, and it is described as "...a medieval monastic house connected by acres of green space to Coventry's bustling urban community".

Be A Chorister For A Day!


Saturday, 5 July, 1:00pm-4:30pm

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 4 June 2025, at Leek Wootton Village Hall. Discussion included the following:

EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

- The Parish Council reviewed the VE Day 80 celebrations and also considered something to acknowledge VJ Day 80 on 15 August, but nothing is firmly arranged at this stage.
- The School & Community Fête is being run by the school on 21 June.
 The PC is supporting the event by sourcing a PA system and helping to
 organise some stalls with local community groups, etc. At the time of writing
 the event has not yet taken place, but we look forward to a successful
 event.
- The Community Café has been running on Friday mornings since 6 June at the back of the church. Open to everyone, including dog walkers and their dogs, it has already welcomed parents from the school and many others.
- Community Live! 2025 will take place on Saturday, 6 September. If you would like to represent a local group or club, please contact communitylive@leekwootton.org.uk
- Interest has been expressed in more Emergency Life Skills Training sessions, so the PC will be booking some in the Autumn. Details to follow.

SCHOOL 20-MPH ZONE

Following the question raised by PC in May, C/Cllr Edwards confirmed that, following the WCC elections, the funding is still in place for the installation of a 20-mph zone in the vicinity of the school. However, he was not able to find out when the project will progress. The PC and C/Cllr Edwards continue to seek further information.

ROAD SAFETY AT SKEW BRIDGE (RAILWAY BRIDGE), HILL WOOTTON ROAD/B4115

On behalf of the PC, C/Cllr Edwards has met with the Head of Road Safety, WCC, following evidence of a collision (a detached bumper on the verge nearby). The signage was significantly improved at this location in 2021. The Road Safety Team is evidence-led and C/Cllr Edwards was informed that

there have been no incidents reported at this location and he would be grateful if any incidents or near-misses be reported in order to build up a record of evidence. Please send reports of incidents, Police incident numbers or dash-cam footage to clerk@leekwoottonandguyscliffeparish.gov.uk and benedwards@warwickshire.gov.uk.

Evidence-based reports are extensively used to decide on future road safety improvements and policing priorities, so please report incidents to www.warwickshire.police.uk/ro/report or, alternatively, you can contact the Warwick Rural West Safer Neighbourhoods Team at www.warwickshire.police.uk/area/your-area/local-policing-team-contact/contact-your-local-policing-team.

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE

A number of issues have been raised with relevant authorities and are moving forward:

- Residents in Woodloes Lane have requested a grit bin to be located near
 the bridge over the A46 and following consultation with WCC Highways, the
 PC has secured agreement that, if the PC purchases and installs a bin, they
 will add it to their refilling schedule each year. The PC will now purchase
 and install a new bin.
- The PC has been trying for some time to identify which authority/department is responsible for ensuring street lights are not overgrown. PLEASE, if you have a street light outside your property can you bear this in mind when planning tree and/or hedge maintenance. Reminder: Bird nesting season runs from March to August, so no maintenance should take place during that time.
- The pavement adjacent to the wooded area on Warwick Road, north of the Tidmarsh Road 'snicket' (cut-through) is currently narrow and low due to overgrowth. This land is the property of Warwickshire County Council and the PC has asked for its maintenance to be considered going forward. The overgrown ivy further north, opposite the bus stop/Recreation Ground access ramp has also been scheduled to be tidied.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7:30pm on Wednesday, 2 July 2025, at Leek Wootton Village Hall. The Parish Council does not meet in August.

OBITUARIES

Peter Donald Van de Wiel 1926-2025

Peter was born in Coventry on 7 June 1926 to Dorothy and Armand Van de Wiel, a Belgian émigré. He was educated in Coventry and qualified as a Metallurgist from Coventry Technical College before working at Stirling Metals and then Standard Triumph. The family moved to Kenilworth before WWII.

Peter married Betty James in 1951, and they built a house and lived on the Leamington Road in Kenilworth with their three children, Sue, Martin and David.

He joined a company in the town run by Harry Langford, a manufacturer's agent, where he became a partner, then the sole owner, developing a very successful company and career.

In 1965 Betty, Peter and family moved to Hill Wootton House. This was a happy move, and Peter began to get involved at All Saints' Church when the then incumbent, The Rev Charles Nettleship, encouraged his lapsed Christian faith - he had been raised as a Catholic. Very soon the family was attending Sunday services and Peter's confirmation classes were held in The Anchor! There were family baptisms, confirmations, weddings and burials

and his association with the church lasted for more than 50 years. Peter was a perfectionist in all he did; he became Chairman of the Fabric Committee and project managed the reordering of the church, jobs he loved.

Sadly, Betty died in 1980, but he went on to marry Vivienne Griffiths in 1981, a widow within their mutual group of friends. They too enjoyed attending All Saints' while living in Kenilworth, firstly on Fieldgate Lane and latterly in an apartment at The Gallery, near to the clock tower. Vivienne's health first began to fail in 2006, but even as she became more incapacitated, Peter was an amazing carer for her in their home until she died in 2019.

2020. during the COVID-19 pandemic, Peter had a stroke and was initially treated in Warwick Hospital before being moved to the Woodside Hall Nursing Home on the Isle of Wight. He was looked after extremely well, family and friends visited for five vears and there always was recognition, usually a smile and a laugh as well. He died peacefully on Sunday, 23 March and his ashes now rest in the churchyard alongside those of Betty and of Vivienne.

KENILWORTH PROBUS I CLUB

Probus met at LWSC as usual on Tuesday, 17 June. This month the speaker was Anthony Hornsby from Sherbourne Recycling, following on from the visit made to the facility by some members of the Club in March.

Sherbourne Recycling is a company operating a plant in Coventry that has been constructed, paid for and owned by eight local authorities in the area including Warwick District Council and Warwickshire County Council. It handles all the domestic recycling from the eight councils. It is unique in the country, separating out the different elements of glass, paper and metals.

The company was founded in 2021, and the plant is a Materials Recycling Facility (MRF) that utilises specialist AI to process dry mixed residential kerbside recycling in the most sustainable and efficient way possible.

We learnt how the plant operates, how the sorted material that leaves the plant is 99% free of contamination and therefore accepted by the recycling processors (all UK customers) who therefore pay the best price for the materials received. The company charges a payment for each load of domestic waste received, which funds the company's running costs, and the proceeds from the end processors go to the owners, together with interest on the original cost of the construction of the facility. The energy costs of the facility are derived from solar panels on the roof (20%) and from the Coventry incinerator plant off London Road (80%), where non-recyclable waste is sent.

We also learnt about the domestic recycling material that the plant can handle. It is not designed to handle everything that might be considered recyclable such as wet, food-contaminated or over-sized items. Items are sorted in 2D or 3D, so drink cans need to be 'drink can shaped' to be sorted in 3D, not flattened as for 2D which is sorted differently. The recyclability of glass varies; bottles are OK, but drinking glasses or other glass, whilst processable by the plant, has to be sorted out by the glass recipient companies.

We, as consumers, can help improve levels of recycling through the plant from the current average of 85% and thus help increase the return received by our local authority. Any material not appropriate for the plant should be taken to the local Household Waste Recycling Centre or the local supermarket.

At our next meeting on Tuesday, 15 July we will have a talk by David Fry from Marton Museum of Country Bygones.





As the Link goes to press this month, the UK is expecting its first heatwave of the year. In the UK, a heatwave is declared when the daily temperature of a location meets or exceeds the heatwave temperature threshold for at least three days. There are four heatwave thresholds in the UK reflecting the differences in climate. The lowest, covering places like Wales and Scotland, is 25°c, and the highest, covering London and parts of the East Midlands, is 28°c. The UK experienced a brief but unprecedented extreme heatwave in July 2022, when temperatures in parts of England exceeded 40°C for the first time.

Although many people enjoy warmer, summer weather, anyone can become unwell if they get too hot. People can become unwell through overheating, dehydration, heat exhaustion and heatstroke. Hot weather can also place strains on water and energy networks, road and rail transport, and health and fire services. This can result in power cuts, restriction or loss of water supplies, and disruption to transport.

WHO IS MOST AT RISK?

Hot weather can affect anyone, but some people face a higher risk of being impacted by heat. Some of the groups who may be most at risk are:

- Older adults.
- Babies and young children.
- Pregnant people.
- People with underlying health conditions (particularly heart and breathing problems).
- People who are physically active and spend a lot of time outdoors (e.g., runners, cyclists, manual labourers).
- People experiencing homelessness.

Those who are likely to be at greater risk should take extra care to protect themselves before periods of hot weather. If you know anyone who might be at greater risk you can ensure that they are aware of the actions they need to take to keep themselves safe, and offer practical help if appropriate (e.g. helping them to stock up on water or medication).

ACTIONS YOU CAN TAKE DURING A SPELL OF HOT WEATHER



Drink plenty of fluids. If you are going out, take a refillable bottle filled with water.

Keep out of the sun as much as possible at the hottest time of the day (between 11:00am and 3:00pm).



Apply sunscreen generously and re-apply frequently, especially after activities that remove it, such as swimming or towelling. The NHS website has advice on applying sunscreen correctly (www.nhs.uk/live-well/seasonal-health/sunscreen-and-sun-safety).

Schedule physical activities (e.g., exercise, walking the dog) for times of the day when it is cooler, such as the morning or evening.

Keep your home cool by shading and closing windows and curtains, especially in rooms that face the sun, and opening windows when the air feels cooler (e.g., at night).

During hot weather, it may be cooler outside (in the shade) or in a public building (such as places of worship, local libraries, or supermarkets): visiting these places may be an alternative way of cooling down if you are able to safely travel there without putting yourself at risk from the heat.



Small, closed spaces such as stationary cars can get dangerously hot very quickly. Make sure that babies, children, older adults and pets are not left alone in stationary cars or other closed spaces. Take extra water for journeys on public transport or by car.

Read about the symptoms of heat exhaustion and heatstroke (www.nhs.uk/conditions/heat-exhaustion-heatstroke) and

understand the actions to take if you or someone else has them. Heat exhaustion does not usually need emergency medical help if you can cool down within 30 minutes. If it turns into heatstroke, it needs to be treated as an emergency.

Ensure that family, friends and neighbours who may be at higher risk of becoming unwell are aware of, and following, actions to keep themselves safe.

If you are worried about your own or someone else's health, contact your local pharmacist, your GP or NHS 111, for offer advice and support.

Remember, too, that heatwaves can cause drought, leading to concerns about water supplies. You can help conserve water by doing the following:

- ڒؖڮ
- Turn off taps, as this can waste up to 6 litres of water per minute.
- Consider having a shower instead of a bath.
- Try not to wash your car, or use a bucket rather than a hosepipe.
- Don't pour water down the drain if there's another use for it, such as watering plants.
- In the garden, use a watering can instead of a hosepipe.
- Only use your washing machine and dishwasher if you have a full load and use the eco mode if available, which uses less water and saves energy.
- Install a water saving device in your toilet cistern.

Check your local news and the Severn Trent website regularly for information on water availability in the area and water management actions in force, including actions you can take to help.
