We pray for families at the start of the school year. For youngsters in our communities and others we know.


Some are starting at their school, some are in the final year, for all, there are changes and new experiences.



SOMETHING ABOUT THE TAPESTRY – the eyes of Christ

As you know, I often repeat information and stories from the Friends of the Cathedral newsletter written by its Chairman, Martin Williams. I haven't copied his whole article about the tapestry here, but I have been drawn to two facts in particular.

It is known that, dating back to ancient depictions, Christ's face would have different expressions on either side. For example, one side showing Him as the bearer of mercy and grace and the other side showing Him as the judge of unrepentant sinners. It is understood that Graham Sutherland was partly inspired in his work by ancient icons and if one now looks again at the Sutherland face of Christ you may clearly distinguish two different expressions – that Christ was both human and divine.

Another fascinating fact about our Cathedral tapestry is that the whites of Christ's eyes are not woven in wool, but in pure white silk, which catches the light from the windows.



Have you ever noticed this effect? Or the different facial expressions?

Staying on the subject of the tapestry, there is to be an exhibition in the Cathedral during the Heritage Open Days festival:

THE WOMEN WHO WOVE THE TAPESTRY - A MICRO PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITION

12 September – 21 September, Mon-Sat 10:00am-4:00pm | Sunday 12noon-3:30pm

A micro exhibition of archive photography of some of the French women who wove and brought Graham Sutherland's design to life.

Measuring 23 metres tall the tapestry at Coventry Cathedral is the second largest tapestry in the world. It was woven in one continuous piece by hand on a 500-year-old loom by women in France, using over 900 colours, at the factory of Pinton Freres of Felletin, near Abusson. The twelve weavers were occupied for over two years, and they were subsequently invited to the consecration of the Cathedral.

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 2 July 2025, at Leek Wootton Village Hall. Discussion included the following:

RESIGNATION OF CLLR JONATHAN KINGSTON



At the start of the meeting the Chairman was sad to announce the resignation of Cllr Kingston before the July meeting, "He will be sorely missed; he has been a great asset during his time on the Council and we wish him well." Jonathan was co-opted on 5 July 2022. He will continue to work with the Community Speed Watch group and report lits progress to the PC.

The PC now has 5 sitting Councillors and 3 vacancies – this is a worry as more responsibility is falling on fewer shoulders. In order to provide the service to the community that it would like, the PC really needs to have its full complement of 8 Councillors. If you are interested in supporting your community, please come along to a meeting - every meeting is open to the public to observe - meet the current Councillors and get an idea of what is involved... no pressure!

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY [CIL]

Following a request for feedback and ideas about how to spend CIL money received, the PC considered a number of ideas and decided to look into the cost of installing a step free footpath from the Village Hall to the Children's Playground and possibly around the perimeter of the grounds to the Sports Club. It will also explore whether low level lighting could be installed, to improve access to the Village Hall by residents to the west. This project is at an exploratory stage and will, of course, involve consultation with different parties before any works can take place.

Other ideas that were put forward included various traffic calming/monitoring measures, provision of more defibrillators, allotments, play equipment, other footpath and visual improvements throughout the parish. All have been recorded and, where there are alternative sources of funding or responsibility can be passed to the District or County Councils, these have been done. A number of ideas would require a larger 'pot' of funding or collaboration with other funders.

In the case of additional defibrillators [AEDs], for effective response to cardiac arrest, an AED should ideally be located within a two-minute brisk walk (four minutes there and back) from where it's likely to be needed. This ensures timely access for potentially life-saving defibrillation. The PC is therefore looking at alternative funding sources and is considering locations to fulfil the two-minute criteria. It has been in contact with residents in Hill Wootton to ask for their ideas for an installation location there.

With regards to the suggestion of a sandpit in the Children's Playground, the PC has previously taken advice on this and sandpits are not recommended for safety reasons because litter can be hidden there and cats and other wildlife can make use of them.

Improvements to the condition of the footpath W174 (at the rear of The Hamlet) are the responsibility of Warwickshire County Council Right of Way and this has been reported for their attention.

FUTURE OF THE POLICE ESTATE ('THE LUNCH', WOODLAND AND LAKES)

The PC has for many years been concerned about the condition and future prospects of 'The Lunch' (the woodland on Police land, north and south of Woodcote Lane). This was 'brought to a head' by proposals that the Police lease part of the north Lunch (at the rear of Waller Close) to CALA Homes to create a pedestrian access from the new development to the Recreation Ground and contribute to its green space quota.

The PC invited representatives from Warwick District Council, Warwickshire Wildlife Trust and a company that specialises in public landscaping, for an exploratory meeting in August to discuss how the land might be brought into more public use. The group met on 5 August and, with representatives from the Police estates team, were able to walk through some of the land and inspect conditions for themselves. The meeting ended on a positive note that was very encouraging and the PC hopes to be able to bring more interested parties on-board in due course to put together a proposal for the Police that would improve the land for wildlife and the public.

COMMUNITY LIVE!

The Parish Council is again holding the *Community Live!* event on 6 September. This is an opportunity for residents to find out about clubs and things to do in and around the community. There will be a challenging assault course set up for kids, an art exhibition, a wee Scottish dance, tea and cake served by Explorers saving up for their next expedition, a demo beehive where you can spot the queen bee, people to chat with, and lots more. Please see pages 22 & 23 for further information.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Over the summer months there have been a number of events in which the PC has been involved with a view to increasing community engagement, including:

- Community Speed Watch carried out an early morning session on Hill Wootton Road, and recorded a number of vehicles travelling in excess of 40mph on this 30mph residential road.
- Formal Terms of Reference have been adopted for the Parish Environment Group, that clearly set out the aims and objectives of the group and its relationship with the PC. They may be viewed on the website at https:// leekwoottonandguyscliffeparish.gov.uk/your-parish/lwgc-environmentgroup/
- The Community Café has been running on Friday mornings since the beginning of June. This is an experimental session organised by Cllr Joy Morgan under the Council's Community Engagement remit. The response has been good, despite low-key publicity.

The café is not being run for profit, but for social/community reasons and is proving a popular meeting point for friends and also introducing people who don't already know each other. Joy will be canvassing opinions in September as to whether this initiative should continue and in what form and where.

On VJ Day, 15 August, the café had a wartime theme and all donations received that day will go to *The Royal British Legion*.

- The Parish Council was pleased to see the school open its gates to the community for its School & Community Fête on 21 June, encouraging local groups like the WI to join in and contribute stalls. The PC understands the PTFA were thrilled with the funds raised.
- The Emergency Life Skills Training sessions in 2024 proved popular and two more sessions have been booked. The dates are:



- Thursday, 16 October 13:15-14:45
- Saturday, 25 October 10:15-11:45

There are still some places available, please visit the WI stand at *Community Live!* on 6 September, or contact Cllr Joy Morgan (for email address, see page 10). If you cannot make these dates, or have a group that would like to book, please get in touch, because extra dates may be added, if required.

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE

The PC has had an operational inspection of the Children's Playground undertaken as opposed to the annual RoSPA safety inspection. This is an inspection that looks at the condition of equipment and jobs that need to be done, with a view to then getting a quote for professionals to carry out the work. The PC was pleased that there were no high-risk issues but is looking at having a number of jobs undertaken, including dampers on the gates to prevent them from swinging too fast and buffers replaced in the overhead glider to stop the banging noise. Other, smaller jobs may be undertaken by the PC itself.

Further to a request made by residents on Woodloes Lane, a grit bin has been purchased for installation near the bridge over the A46. Installation will take place before the winter.

C/Cllr Ben Edwards has met with the Warwick District Council [WDC] Localities Officer to walk around the parish and discuss a number of maintenance issues, with a view to allocating responsibility appropriately.

Trees obscuring street lighting – this is Warwickshire County Council [WCC] Forestry responsibility to either remove or consult with landowners. This has been requested, but no time-frame for completion has been received to-date.

The land on Warwick Road between the WI Garden and Rockside is owned by WCC. Contract Services have attended to cut back at pavement level and overhanging trees.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7:30pm on Wednesday, 3 September 2025, at Leek Wootton Village Hall.

For your information, The Fouling of Land by Dogs (Warwick District Council) Order 2011 requires owners to remove faeces deposited by their dog from any land to which the public have access in Warwick District and which is open to the air.

ATTENTION: DOG OWNERS



The Parish Council has received another report of dog waste being found in the Children's Playground. This is not acceptable.

LEEK WOOTTON CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND IS "NO DOGS"

This is clearly signposted at every gate, but people continue to walk dogs through there between Quarry Close/Fields and the Rec, rather than via the Sports Club drive. The playground is, by nature, an open and un-policeable place and people are welcome to walk through, but even if you have always walked your dog through there on a lead, when there are no children playing or because you think no-one has seen you, PLEASE STOP! You may be responsible and do so without incident, but other people will think it is acceptable... it is not!

The Parish Council has received many compliments about the playground, including its feeling of safety for children. It is the only public space in the parish that has a restriction on dogs and YOU are trusted to respect that... that trust is currently being abused.

Know your Highway Code

"I cross the Woodcote Lane junction on foot all the time. Today, from The Anchor side, at approximately 10:00am, I glanced over my right shoulder and saw no car coming. I had taken two steps across the junction when a young driver racing around the corner barely missed me, and shouted obscenities whilst he was at it.

"Please, please can drivers like this young and enthusiastic problem driver be reminded that pedestrians ALWAYS have right of way. They are driving a tonne heavy killing machine and if they drive with such carelessness they can and will get caught out.

"I've noted the car, registration, and driver's description, recorded it and shared it with relevant people."



The following rule came into effect in January 2022: "Rule H2: New Priority for Pedestrians at Junctions. At a junction, drivers, motorcyclists, horse riders and cyclists should give way to pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross a road into which or from which you are turning."

The Club met for its monthly meeting at LWSC on 15 July where, after some Club business, we had a talk by David Fry from the Marton Museum of Country Bygones.



This museum is one of the very few remaining village museums in the country, containing bygones from rural life in that village and other communities in the area. It was developed from a collection gathered together by a George Tims who moved to Marton in 1954. The collection started in his house but in 1964, when it had outgrown the space available, he was offered the stables to the Vicarage. When the church

sold the Vicarage, he was offered a disused barn at a farm in the village. When developers moved into the farm they were required to provide a new building for the museum, and that is where all the exhibits are now located.

When George died in 2005 the future of the museum looked bleak but new trustees were appointed in 2009 and a group of volunteers worked hard to reopen the museum. Since then, it has opened every summer Sunday afternoon. The exhibits were fully catalogued (3,000), the building extended to

18 Guy Street, Leamington Spa, CV32 4RT provide storage for items not on display, the museum itself reorganised to properly display the exhibits, a gift shop created, and an attractive entrance and foyer constructed for the visitor attraction.

David Fry brought with him a number of smaller items from the museum to display and be identified, including an egg gender detector, massage roller, butter pat, turnip picker/knife, egg



scales and various other mysterious artefacts from bygone days of rural life.

The Club met again on 19 August in the usual venue to hear a talk by one of our members, Andrew Mayfield, entitled 'Before the Box Boats'. This was a talk about his life as a merchant naval officer in the days when cargo ships had holds that were loaded with "loose" cargo, before containerisation became the norm. Andrew served with the P & O Line on its cargo vessels. These ships were around 500ft long, circa 70ft wide and had a capacity of some 500,000-cu ft. They had a crew of officers, engineers, trainee officers and Asian deck crew totalling some 50 or so personnel. The vessels were equipped with derricks for loading and unloading cargo and all navigation operations were done by hand, visual observation, brain power and with the use of paper charts and a sextant etc. Loading of the cargo was done manually to ensure that the ship remained stable, that the heavier cargo was lower in the hold and cargo for earlier off-loading was upper most in the hold. His talk told of some of his exploits in those far off days, now long gone.

Containerisation revolutionised shipping and because of size, simplicity of loading, reduced manpower and turn round time reduced costs by upwards of 80%. Containers vary in size from a few hundred 20 or 40ft containers to upwards of 20,000. There are also specialist carriers for gas etc and tankers for oil, grain, coal etc. It was very clear why shipping cargo had changed, together with modern navigation aids such as GPS, electronic charts and computers.

After his time as a marine officer, Andrew went on to university and into industry and IT. He is a volunteer business adviser to the Bishop of the Diocese of Tanganyika and has asked that his speaker's fee goes to the associated charity.

NEXT MEETING:

The next Club meeting will be held 16 September, with a talk by Andy McAvan on 'National Grid'.

This time last year I was writing about the wet weather playing havoc but this year it's the hot and dry weather that has played its part and made it very difficult for mother hogs to find enough food and water for themselves let alone to feed their little ones.

As Autumn rapidly approaches and you tend to your gardens, allotments or communal areas, please consider leaving an undisturbed corner, a messy corner in a quiet, shaded spot. It's





are a fantastic idea too. Did you know that if you want your slug population to be kept under control naturally you should encourage frogs into your garden! They are voracious slug eaters. Contrary to popular belief, slugs and snails are most definitely not part of a hedgehog's natural diet. They naturally carry microscopic internal parasites which will potentially make a hog very sick.

Halloween and Bonfire Night are on the horizon. Please make sure you recycle any pumpkins in the garden recycling bins rather than in the garden. Eating a large amount of vegetable matter can cause a hog to have extremely bad tummy problems and can quickly kill them. You may come across them rooting through windfall fruit, but it is the bugs that are in the fruit that they are after, not the fruit or vegetable. They are insectivores and much prefer a beetle or other creepy crawly.

I know not many people have bonfires in their gardens these days, but if you do, please check for wildlife at the base before you light it. Please also make sure

that any netting is stored away where wildlife can't get tangled up in it.

Remember, if you find a hog out in the day 'it's not OK' - please contact myself or one of the Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue team.

You should act quickly if the hog is wobbly, being pestered by flies or birds, sunbathing or if they are injured or looking thin (a dipped neck or shaped like a rugby ball rather than a football).

Please continue to support hogs with a shallow dish of water - it's a life saver in these dry days and where possible, some kitten or good quality hedgehog biscuits such as Spikes, Brambles or Mr Johnson's.

LWCC Round Up

Another cricket season is drawing to its conclusion but there's been plenty to celebrate at Leek Wootton CC this summer, both on and off the pitch. There have been great individual performances, stunning team victories, and great developments behind the scenes.

On a cricketing front, first XI find themselves in the top half of the Cotswold Hills League (CHL) Premier Division, securing top level cricket for yet another season for 2026. Whilst there have been defeats to some of the lower ranked teams, there have also been stunning victories against top of the league sides too, showing how competitive the team has been. Sandeep Murthy has been the lead batter, scoring over 450 runs at an average of 41, with a top score of 99. From a bowling perspective, Yash Sharma and Sam Cox have taken the most wickets, with 25 each. One of the highlights over the past few months has been Andy McAvan's undefeated 104 to lead Wootton to a victory over Adlestrop in a tricky chase, his first century for the Club.

For the second team, 2025 has been a tough season, with availability issues throughout, but with a couple of games to go, the side is on the verge of securing CHL Division Two cricket for 2026. One victory from the side's final two league games will secure survival, thanks to brilliant victories over Woodbourne (by 1 run!) and previously undefeated Norton Lindsey 1s at home, where Wootton chased down 211 to win. It's not been an easy season, but the side has shown great fight towards the end of the year. Ever reliable skipper Mike Allison has been the main run getter for the side, scoring 427 runs at an average of just under 33. His best performance has been an undefeated 99 to lead his side to victory over Shipston on Stour, on his birthday! In terms of bowling, Devan Lota is the leading wicket taker and has claimed 15 at an average of 15.5.

In the midweek league, Wootton struggled to compete in their first campaign, winning just one of their 6 matches. Barney Dillow scored over 200 runs in the









campaign, averaging over 50, whereas Desmond Fernando was Wootton's leading wicket taker with 7 victims. In Sunday cricket, Lewis Couchman was made Wootton's skipper, and his side has enjoyed some good victories during the year. At the time of writing, not all of the matches have been added to the Club website, but since the last update, there have been some standout performances, such as Arslan Awan's century against Bedworth, or Graeme Couchman's 4/20 against Stoneleigh.

There's much more to the Cricket Club than just the matches we play. Over the past couple of years, the Club has hosted Warwickshire youth matches at the War Memorial Recreation Ground and this year there were two fixtures; an Under 15s fixture against S Brown ANZAC EPP side from Australia & New Zealand, and a two-day fixture against Yorkshire Under 14s. Against the S Brown ANZAC match, Warwickshire secured a thrilling 1 wicket victory, chasing 211, in front of a large crowd at the Club. Our southern hemisphere friends were very complimentary of our ground, and the day was a big success. In the case of the Yorkshire match, the game ended in a draw, with young Warwickshire batter Najibullah Qani scoring 122 not out. The fact the Club has

been asked to host these matches is a testament to the work that Elliott Haynes -Sorrell and Graeme Couchman have done on the ground over the past few years, so we thank them for their work!

Last but not least, it would be amiss to not mention our new shirt sponsor for 2025 Julie Philpot Residential.
